
We'll give advance notice here of another concert later in the year, just after our production of *The* Sorcerer.



# A Trip to Pfennig-Halbpfennig

It was a high powered society delegation which came together at a layby just off the M62 Junction 30 in the midst of Yorkshire's famed "Rhubarb Triangle". The President, the Chairman, a Life Vice President & distinguished former Chairman (Mr T Roberts), and two principal performers (Mr J Tattersall & Ms Christine Roberts) were off to Cottingham to see Hull Savoyards present *The Grand Duke*. Once John had finished his fish & chips and the President his sandwiches, and when everyone had enjoyed an al fresco parkin biscuit presented by the Chairman, all piled into John's venerable Saab estate for a scenic journey east in beautiful summer solstice sunshine, taking in the M62 and a short cut through North Cave and Little Weighton, before arriving at a car park right in front of the venue. Traffic had been good, and there was ample free time available before we needed to take our seats. All but one of the party went to the pub, the other went off, armed only with a camera, in search of buses.

What a treat we had on sitting down - a competent orchestra set the scene with the lively overture, before the action unfolded in what looked like a scene from *Oklahoma* - the setting had been moved from the customary 'somewhere in western Europe' to the American town of Pfennig Halbpfennig, somewhere in the Old West. The eponymous magnus dux was the ill-tempered Sheriff. The cast were clearly having a whale of a time as the story proceeded. Some of the longer songs were cut, but this did no harm at all. Stuart Sellens, as producer, appeared and disappeared on stage as various minor characters, stage hand, and photographer. Zoë Sellens, as Lisa, played the overlooked soubrette perfectly. Leon Waksberg was a suitably bemused unintentionally polygamous Ludwig, and Louise Jacques was a confident Princess of Monte Carlo.

It was good to see a large and enthusiastic chorus supporting the principals, and even better to see a number of distinctly young performers. All were clearly enjoying themselves, and so we enjoyed it all the more. It certainly gave us hope that live G&S still has a future.

At the end of the performance, a man seated in the row in front of us turned round and asked each of our party their date of birth, before promptly coming back with a celebrity fact for that date. Such is the bizarre plot of *The Grand Duke*, even by Gilbert's topsy turvy standards, that not one of us found this a particularly odd thing to have happened during the evening. All too soon, then, we were heading west in John's Saab, observing that it was not yet fully dark even though it was nearly 11pm. We all had a great evening and agreed it was time we revived *The Grand Duke* for a club night!
