SYNOPSIS

The story of "The Sorcerer" is as follows. Alexis, son of Sir Marmaduke Pointdextre, is betrothed to Aline, daughter of Lady Sangazure, in the village of Ploverleigh. The vicar of Ploverleigh, Dr. Daly, well describes the atmosphere at the beginning of the opera with the first words of his recitative, "The air is filled with amatory numbers." Constance, daughter of Mrs. Partlet the pew opener, shyly expresses her love for Dr. Daly, but he, ignorant of her affections, states that he is now too old to give any thoughts to the question of matrimony. After Sir Marmaduke and Lady Sangazure have expressed their delight at the forthcoming marriage of their respective offspring, Alexis and Aline are at last left alone, and the former, firmly believing that the ecstasies of love should be enjoyed by all, declares that he has procured the services of John Wellington Wells, the Family Sorcerer, who then appears, and agrees to supply a potion which will cause those who drink it to fall asleep, and on waking immediately fall in love with their first opposite acquaintance. There follows an incantation scene in which Mr. Wells summons the relevant spirits, and he then pours the love potion into the teapot destined to be used at the village party to be held in honour of the aforementioned betrothal. The party then takes place amid great rejoicing, and the First Act closes with the obvious evidence of the effect of the potion, as those who have drunk it fall insensibly to the floor.

At the beginning of Act Two, it is even more evident that the potion has worked. The villagers awake and immediately come under the amatory spell which the potion has cast. However, the ensuing "pairings" of the principal characters involve considerable confusion: Constance falls in love with the deaf Notary, Mrs. Partlet with Sir Marmaduke, Lady Sangazure with Mr. Wells, and Aline, who is persuaded by Alexis to drink the potion herself in order to emphasise her love for him, with Dr. Daly. The only way to break the spell which has brought about the confusion, is for either Alexis or Mr. Wells to give up his life to Ahrimanes, the evil spirit. This Mr. Wells finally agrees to do and, the spell being thus broken, the lovers revert to their original pairings, so that Sir Marmduke pairs with Lady Sangazure, Aline with Alexis, Dr. Daly with Constance and the Notary with Mrs. Partlet. The chorus also make corresponding changes.
