### THE STORY OF THE OPERA

### ACT I

When the curtain rises the pirates are celebrating the completion of the indentures of Frederic, their apprentice, and it is disclosed by Ruth "piratical maid of all work" and former nursery maid, that he had been bound in error to a PIRATE instead of a PILOT.

Frederic decides to leave the life, which he loathes, and Ruth tries to persuade him to take her with him. Catching sight of Major-General Stanley's lovely daughters, Frederic realises that Ruth is not the paragon of beauty she has led him to believe. He thereupon denounces her and casts her from him.

Frederic meets the girls on the shore and appeals to them to save him, but they turn away from him, all except Mabel. The girls' reaction to the declaration of mutual love by Frederic and Mabel is rudely interrupted by the arrival of the pirates who seize the girls and propose to marry them. The Major-General arrives and pleads with the pirates not to deprive him of his daughters, playing on their feelings by pretending he is an orphan. The girls and their father are released and the act ends with general rejoicing.

### ACT II

The Major-General is filled with remorse at having escaped from the clutches of the pirates by telling a lie, and the act opens with his daughters trying to console him. Frederic, anxious to atone for his former misdeeds, is to lead a squad of police for the apprehension of his erstwhile comrades.

The police do not relish the job, but duty must be done, and the party is just off when Ruth and the Pirate King arrive and inform Frederic that it has been discovered he was born on February 29th. It is pointed out that he was apprenticed until his twenty-first birthday, and that as he has only had five birthdays he is in honour bound to return and finish his apprenticeship. The pirates, having discovered the Major-General's lie, swear vengeance.

Mabel endeavours to dissuade Frederic from rejoining the pirate band but he refuses to put love before duty. She thereupon calls upon the police to proceed and is reminded by the Sergeant that "a policeman's lot is not a happy one."

Police and pirates enter the ruined chapel and conceal themselves, the police being unobserved by the pirates.

When the Major-General arrives with his daughters they are seized by the pirates. The police intervene and a fight ensues. The police are overcome, but the Sergeant calls upon the pirates to yield in the Queen's name, which they do. Ruth pleads for the release of the pirates, disclosing that they are noblemen who have gone wrong. They are promptly released and each is endowed with one of the Major-General's daughters. Frederic is reunited to Mabel and the Sergeant accepts Ruth, bringing the opera to a happy ending. opera to a happy ending.
